About Dental Assisting

- Dental assistants play a valuable role in dental offices
- Practice owners are dedicated to providing competitive wages and benefits reflecting that value
- Dental assistants help patients by providing in-person oral health services
- The role provides job security, flexible hours, ongoing professional development, and a career ladder





What Dental Assistants Do

- Help make patients comfortable before, during, and after treatment
- Work closely with dental hygienists, dentists, front office staff and other members of the dental team
- Prepare and organize dental instruments needed by dentists to work on a patient
- Take X-rays and impressions (certification required)
- Take medical history and provide post-operative instructions
- Schedule appointments

Career Training & Pathways

- Training as a dental assistant doesn't have to be like pulling teeth. In Massachusetts, there are four tiers of dental assistants based on the training you do.
 1. ***On-the-job trained (OJT) dental assistant*** – receives training in a dental office directly from a licensed, supervising dentist
 2. ***Formally Trained Dental Assistant*** – receives formal training in a dental assisting program at a college or university for at least one year
 3. ***DANB Certified Dental Assistant (CDA)*** – receives DANB-approved training in dental assisting and goes on to become a Certified Dental Assistant (CDA)
 4. ***Expanded Function Dental Assistant (EFDA)*** – receives DANB-approved training, holds a CDA, and completes a formal training program in expanded functions
